Step Six: Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

"Am I ready, willing and able to have all of my defects of character removed?" "Of course, I am, what fool wants to keep those things that are blocking the individual from a better life". Oh, wait a minute, it says 'all' my defects of character. I want to be a better person, but some of my failings are fun, and everybody knows that my shortcomings don't hurt anybody else. How is that for rationale? It is obvious how your defects affect others, but not mine.

Taking away all my character defects will change me too much. Are we back to that Step Three, where I give all my life/will to God as I understand Him. Now I really will end up in South America, wrapping bandages for the poor, or standing on a corner handing out religious literature. This is too much to ask.

And then the sponsor reminds me that half measures availed us nothing, and was I still really willing to go to any lengths. Even pausing over the answers to those questions, would reveal that my old life was a sham – and I did harm others – in spite of my protesting to the contrary. Family, coworkers, fellow employees were all affected by my inability to return their caring. But I was blinded by my ego.

The end result is that I have to be willing to be 'entirely' ready to have God remove these defects. God will not strike me white as the clean driven snow – He will assist me in changing my life to be a better son, husband, father, brother, etc. It will require time and positive actions on my part, but the results will be a better me – not a better them. And as Bill W. states in the Twelve and Twelve, this Step Six will "separate the men from the boys".

TRADITION SIX: An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

If ever a Tradition spoke to the group rather than the individual, this is the one where it would be easy to say, "see, these Traditions apply only to the business end of A.A." However, after spending years attending meetings all over the States and the World, it is important that each individual understand the Tradition core.

All the Traditions were hewed from our early mistakes. This one came about because some of the early pioneers in New York (mainly our co founder, Bill W.) wanted to open A.A. hospitals/treatment centers. We would have been lending our A.A. name to facilities that should of necessity be outside A.A.

Thank goodness for the minority voices in the groups! There are no chains of hospitals/treatment centers, and we own no property, so there is no need to argue over fiscal issues. Many new members are confused by Alano clubs. Those certainly have an A.A. flavor, but they are not owned by A.A. Good, solid, members of A.A. did band together and form a corporation, outside of the group, to buy and then lease space to meetings. It is important that the groups only pay rent, not be compelled to give their entire intake to the club. The groups are allowed to pay rent to meet at the Alano club — or move to other quarters. We cooperate with outside facilities that request our assistance, always remembering that we follow their rules when in their institution. Therefore each group or squad should have their own treasurer, so that monies get distributed not only for rent, but also to the various other A.A. entities (i.e., District, Area, Intergroup, the General Service Office).

As an aside to this, I must remember that in my family I am but one vote, so I have no right to lend the family name to what others in the family might not consider proper.

CONCEPT SIX: On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Such a long Concept, therefore it is most important to be familiar with the Conference Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board. The beginning of running A.A. starts with the shareholders, individual A.A. groups. It would be impossible for all the groups in the US & Canada to get to one location to discuss the operations, therefore, we select those people called Delegates to represent us at the annual meetings. These Delegates are proxy-holders, who then select directors – that would be the General Service Board Trustees – who do operate the business. The Trustees actually own and control our two subsidiaries, A.A. World Services and A.A. Grapevine. Those two organizations carry on all the services of our fellowship, under the lead of the Trustees.

The result of all of this is that our Trustees must be given powers to manage the daily affairs of A.A. through the staff at the General Service Office. The Trustees are responsible for millions of dollars in cash flow on an annual basis. They guide public information, are guardians of our Twelve Traditions and take on the guidance of the A.A. message to other countries. We, as individual members of our groups, therefore, must be cognizant of the powers we entrust to these servant leaders, and vote with an informed conscience rather than just vote. With that caution in mind, we can then trust the Trusted.
