Step Ten: Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

My progression since coming into AA and a new way of life has been so rapid, I count my blessings and give thanks to my Higher Power several times daily.

At the end of my article, "My Wife Divorced Me" (March '67), I said I didn't know how I could ever repay the AA program. Since that time I am learning how to make repayment.

First, I thank God (as I understand Him) for AA, then I attend meetings as often as possible, make visits to the alcoholic clinic and try to carry the message. But I believe my biggest way of making payments is by practicing the AA principles in all my affairs.

I have found a wonderful life and I just try to share it with everyone I come in contact with. I am a mailman, and meet many people every day.

Many of these people remember me when I was lost in the mahogany jungle and want to know how I found my way out, and came back such a changed person. I'm not very anonymous on my mail route, as I sure as hell wasn't before. (I was just reminded the other day of the time I was delivering the U.S. mail half loaded on a child's skate board. I was in a hurry to have one of those appointed rounds of drinks at the local pub. Sometimes I wonder how I even salvaged my job out of some of the chaos I caused which I cannot mention in its entirety.)

I'm very proud of AA. I don't advertise it openly but when someone asks, the mail gets delayed slightly while I tell them of a wonderful way of life available to all of them and it doesn't cost a cent.

So far I've had some success in my mail-route Twelfth Step work. I am very proud of a barmaid, who though only sober a short time is doing a wonderful job, under very tempting circumstances. I can see the remarkable change in her every day. It surely is a miracle.

My greatest enjoyment is practicing the AA principles in all my affairs. As I take the Tenth Step I don't find very many wrongs I have to admit, and it is so simple to practice the principles I don't know how I ever missed them before.

- 7. It is that which makes man totally selfish, in that his sobriety must, to him, be the most important thing in all the world, yet which makes man into a totally unselfish person in his desire to share with his fellow man.
- 8. It is that which talks not of rewards after death yet which prepares man for the greatest blessing eternity can offer—for "he that bath done it unto the least of these, my brethren, has done it unto me."
- 9. It is that which takes the weakest man and turns him into a 'man of courage, strength and great will power.
- 10. It is that which takes total strangers and almost instantly turns them into the closest of friends.
- 11. It is that which requires no formal education, yet which turns man into a philosopher.
- 12. It is that which man must not give up, yet the more of it he gives away, the more he possesses.
